



Mono Lake Committee Scholarship

The Mono Lake Committee supports students pursuing higher education who display a personal connection with Mono Lake. Up to two scholarships of \$1,000 each will be awarded each school year.

Qualifications

Applicants must:

1. be a High School Senior
2. have firm plans to attend a 2- or 4-year college within a year of graduation
3. be a Mono County resident

Scholarship funds

1. The Committee will award up to two \$1,000 scholarships to successful applicants.
2. Scholarship winners will be announced at graduation.
3. Award winners must send proof of registration for their first semester and their social security number to the Mono Lake Committee, at which time a check for the full \$1,000 will be sent.
4. Submitted essays may be printed in Mono Lake Committee publications and on the Mono Lake Committee website at monolake.org/mlc/scholarship. A photograph with the award winner for use in Mono Lake Committee publications and on the Mono Lake Committee website at monolake.org/mlc/scholarship is required as well.

Deadline

Completed application must be delivered to the Mono Lake Committee office in Lee Vining by **5:00pm on the second Friday in May** each year.

2. the essay

Mono Lake Committee Scholarship: Personal essay question

This is a different kind of essay application! There are three parts:

1. Get yourself down to Mono Lake—somewhere close to the shoreline. You will need to take some time (at least 15 minutes) to be there with no distractions. Be sure to be prepared for the elements, and to give yourself enough time to both experience the place and to write your thoughts down. This should be fun, and easy! Find a comfortable place along the shore where you can sit for a while and use your senses to take in your surroundings.
2. In a notebook (or your writing implement of choice) jot down what you see, hear, smell, and feel around you. Then reflect on this question: Why do places like Mono Lake matter?
3. Take your notes and craft a 300–500 word essay on your experience.

There is no right answer for this essay. We would like to know what Mono Lake makes you think about when you have a quiet moment there to listen to your thoughts.
